Our objectives this semester are to continue developing your speaking, reading, writing, and listening skills in Arabic at the intermediate to high-intermediate level. To this end, we will use a wide variety of authentic materials and real-world tasks, including classroom and online discussions and journals, Arabic social media, video- and audio-materials, etc.

## **EXPECTED OUTCOMES**

By the end of this course, you should have achieved solid intermediate proficiency in Arabic Language and you should:

- Be able to read texts on familiar topics and understand the main ideas.
- Have confidence in your ability to guess the meaning of new words from context.
- Be able to speak about yourself, your life, and your environment, and initiate and sustain conversations on a number of daily life topics.
- Understand native speakers accustomed to dealing with foreign learners of Arabic.
- Be able to write paragraphs on familiar topics.
- Be able to understand all basic sentence structure of Arabic.
- Be aware of aspects of Arabic culture connected to everyday life.

#### POLICIES

**PLEASE NOTE**: You need my **explicit permission** to use any technological device during class. That includes phones, laptops, tablets, cameras, and anything else that captures and/or transmits sound and/or image.

#### ATTENDANCE

Attendance is mandatory. I will take attendance at the beginning of each class period and will update your Attendance grade on Carmen weekly. Each student is allowed THREE absences with no grade penalty. After the third absence, you will lose 1 point for each absence. If you miss a class for a documented legitimate reason (illness, emergency, military requirement), you need to contact me as soon as possible to work out a plan for making up the missed work. Please note that having an excuse for your absence does not mean you do not lose points for the missed class. It only means that you will be allowed to make up the work or assessments you missed.

#### MAKE-UPS

If you miss a class when a graded activity was scheduled, you will be allowed to make that up **only if you have a documented legitimate reason for your absence. It is your responsibility to contact me in a timely manner to make up tests**. I will generally not allow make-ups on tests that have already been graded and returned. No make-ups are allowed for the short quizzes, for any reason.

#### HOMEWORK

You should plan for approximately one hour of daily homework every weekday and approximately five to six hours of homework each weekend.

Homework assignments for each week will be posted on Carmen the preceding Friday. It is your responsibility to check each day after class for changes to the homework schedule. Opportunities to redo failed homework assignments **may** be given at my discretion. Please note that **any external help** with assignments, including from classmates, tutors, or family members, unless specifically allowed in the assignment instructions, will be considered academic misconduct and reported accordingly. If you are having trouble with an assignment, come to my office hours.

There will be two types of homework assignments this semester: daily and weekly. **Daily** assignments will include vocabulary and grammar exercises. These will be due the following class meeting and will be

graded on a pass/fail basis. **Weekly** assignments will include Aswaat Arabiyya listening assignments, online speaking activities, and writing activities for the first half of the semester, and an integrated group project in the second half of the semester. Weekly homework assignments will be due a week from the date they are assigned and will receive a percentage grade. Specific instructions and grading scheme will be posted on Canvas for each weekly homework as it is assigned.

# OFFICE HOURS

Arabic is not an easy language to learn, especially at the beginning when you still have not developed the study skills you need. If you feel confused or overwhelmed, do talk to me! I am in my office every Thursday and Friday 4:30-5:30PM, and you can also set up an appointment to meet with me at a different time or talk to me online (through Skype or Carmen Connect). Do not be afraid to come and discuss any and all questions or concerns that you have. If your homework, quizzes or work in class indicate that you are struggling, I may also email you and ask you to schedule a meeting with me and discuss learning strategies.

I expect all students in my classes to interact with each other and with me with respect, tolerance, and genuine effort at understanding.
