- 1. to introduce you to the Hebrew Bible by studying Genesis-2 Kings and other related texts;
- 2. to acquaint you with some of the major themes and literary features of these texts;
- 3. to familiarize you with different approaches to reading the Bible critically.

#### **CLASS PARTICIPATION:**

#### \$HOMEWORK AND PARTICIPATION:

There will be six written assignments; they will be due on August 29; September 12; October 3, 19, 26; November 7. Each will consist of a 250 word essay on an assigned topic (you will be given a choice). They are to be submitted electronically via the CANVAS Dropbox. We will discuss them in class. They will be checked, but not individually graded or marked. All assignments must be completed on time.

#### **OUIZZES**:

There will be **eight** short quizzes (5 questions) <u>drawn directly from guiding questions posted in advance on the CANVAS website</u>. The best **six** quiz grades will be averaged into the final grade. Quiz dates: **August 31**, **September 7**, **14**, **26**; **October 24**, **31**, **November 9**, **28**.

# **EXAMINATIONS**:

There will be **two** examinations:

- 1. **Tuesday, October 17**, covering material presented in sessions1-13;
- 2. **Tuesday, December 5**, covering material presented in sessions 14-25;

The examinations will each be **80 minutes long** and will consist of short-answer and essay questions. Study guides will be distributed in advance and posted on CANVAS.

#### REQUIRED READINGS:
