OBJECTIVES:

This course introduces the student to Hebrew literary and cultural texts from the biblical to the modern period. Focusing on Jerusalem, we will gain familiarity with a variety of Hebrew literary genres and their distinctive features. While continuing to build vocabulary and reading skills, students will be encouraged to read these texts critically and analytically. Secondary readings (in English) on the history and cultural life of Jerusalem, as well as on select literary genres, will provide additional insights.

REQUIREMENTS, WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS AND EXAMINATIONS:

PARTICIPATION:

Please note: The course will be run as a seminar, and will be largely student-led. Each student will be responsible for leading the discussion of one of the week's assigned texts. This will involve careful reading of the material to be discussed, as well as background reading assigned. Guidelines for preparation of these regular presentations will be provided by the instructor. For the most part, the course will be conducted **in Hebrew**, but will accommodate varying levels of proficiency.

QUIZZES:

There will be **four** brief quizzes during the semester. The quizzes will cover texts already read and discussed in class. Students will be asked to translate these texts without using a dictionary. Quizzes cannot be rescheduled.

TERM PAPER:

Each student will write a 5 page term paper, with full bibliography and annotation, on an individualized topic to be chosen in consultation with the instructor. Graduate students will be expected to write a 10 page paper.

ORAL PRESENTATIONS:

Students will be required to deliver a 15-minute oral presentation on their individualized research topics. PowerPoint presentations are welcome.
