The Seminar in Iranian Studies consists of intensive investigation of a selected topic or problem in Iranian linguistics, philology, literature, religion, or culture. This iteration of the Seminar covers **Zoroastrian Middle Persian** (also known as "Pahlavi") and surveys the extant texts in the language. It introduces the history of the Persian language with a focus on the constitution of Middle Persian. It also introduces the major reference tools for studying this language to seminar participants.

#### **Learning Objectives**

Students finishing this course will be able to read Middle Persian texts with the assistance of reference works. They will have surveyed the contents of Zoroastrian Middle Persian literature. They will understand the history of Persian in its outline and the historical phonology and morphology of Middle Persian. The main goal is to acquire the ability to use Zoroastrian Middle Persian sources as research tools.
